ISBE Accelerated Placement Act CPS Policy Proposal Board Briefing

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Accelerated Placement Act [Public Act 100-0421]

Accelerated Placement refers to the placement of a student in an academically appropriate instructional setting with appropriate level curriculum. Acceleration is not limited to students who have been identified as gifted and talented, but an equitable option to students who demonstrate high ability and who may benefit from accelerated placement.

The recommended Accelerated Placement Act policy for CPS will be applicable in the following areas:

- Early Entrance Acceleration
- Whole-Grade Acceleration
- Single Subject Acceleration

ISBE is still in the process of developing its administrative rules for implementing the Act.





Accelerated Placement Act Policy

105 ILCS 5/14A-32Sec. 14A-32. Accelerated placement; school district responsibilities. Each school district shall have a policy year that allows for accelerated placement that **includes or incorporates** by reference **the following components**:

- (1) a provision that provides that participation in accelerated placement is not limited to those children who have been identified as gifted and talented, but rather is **open to all children who demonstrate high ability and who may benefit from accelerated placement**;
- (2) a fair and equitable decision-making process that **involves multiple persons** and includes a student's parents or guardians;
- (3) **procedures for notifying parents or guardians** of a child of a decision affecting that child's participation in an accelerated placement program; and
- (4) an assessment process that includes multiple valid, reliable indicators.





Early Entrance to Kindergarten

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Current Policy	Recommended Policy
There is no existing policy in CPS to allow students to enroll into Kindergarten early.	 The district will continue to maintain its current policy of accepting children to kindergarten who turn 5 years old by Sept. 1st cut-off date. NEW:To be eligible for early entrance to Kindergarten, the child's fifth birthday must fall between September 2 and December 31 of the current school year, as documented by a certified birth certificate. Children must have completed one year of preschool. Application and Testing Parent will complete the application form along with the Developmental Survey in one of our site locations. Parent must bring a copy of the child's birth certificate and proof of identification and residency. Student must meet the criteria on the developmental survey. Parent will be notified in writing if student will move forward with testing. The child must score 91st percentile or higher (score of 120) as measured by an individual test of cognitive ability and 91st percentile or higher (score of 120) in academic task assessment. Individual student testing will be performed by CPS Psychologists Testing fee of \$ 50.00 will apply. A waiver for FRL families will be made available upon request.

Early Entrance Placement Criteria

Pre-Qualifiers: School Factors Testing

Age	Developmental Survey	Achievement
The child's fifth birthday falls between September 2 and December 31 of the current school year,	Child must pass the Developmental Screen by scoring in the 91st percentile or higher (score of 120).	Child must pass the Academic and Cognitive exam with a score of 91st percentile or higher (score of 120).
Child must have completed one year of preschool.

- School Transition Team will meet with parents
- Parent Signature Form confirms APA agreement

Whole Grade Acceleration

Current Policy	Recommended Policy
There is no existing policy in CPS for whole grade acceleration/grade skipping.	 Students in grades 3rd-6th will be considered for whole grade acceleration upon meeting all requirements beginning with the application process in January 2020-March 2020.

- Testing Fee: \$250. Waivers will be made available to FRL families.
- Schools will be required to form a Student Transition Team that will develop a parent approved plan to support the student throughout the school year.
- Team and parent will review progress at the end of the first quarter and determine whether student will continue at the current grade or re-evaluate student progress.
- The Office of T&L will develop a Guidance Document for schools and parents.

Student must score \geq 50 points to be considered for next phase of the process: Testing

AAA subscale score possible points: 22 points

- If Academic Ability, Aptitude, and Achievement Subscale Score is < 10 whole grade acceleration is NOT Recommended.
- If Academic Ability, Aptitude, and Achievement Subscale Score is > 10, the student may be a good candidate for whole grade acceleration.

IOWA Acceleration Scale Grand Total: possible 80 points

60-80 points : Excellent candidate for whole -grade acceleration





Single Subject Acceleration

Current Policy	Recommended Policy
There is no existing policy in CPS on single subject acceleration	 Students in grades 3-7 can be considered for single subject acceleration in math or reading upon meeting all requirements. Schools that already use accelerated reading or math groupings within grade levels can continue to utilize this structure. However, there is lack of consistency across the district on single subject acceleration, and thus, the district is formalizing the policy.

Testing Fee: \$35. Waivers will be made available to families. At the end of the first quarter, the School Transition Team and parent will reconvene to reevaluate student progress.






