Reopening schools is an issue of equity



Equity at the Core with a Focus on Safety

- Equity is a moral imperative, and the district is focused on equitably responding to the COVID-19 pandemic
- Schools are essential, and public health officials support schools staying open
- Our schools are safe because of the safety protocols we put in place, such as use of masks, social distancing, disinfecting, and ventilation

Vaccination Prioritization for Hardest-Hit Communities	Prioritize vaccinations based on the level of exposure to others and ability to reliably maintain mitigation measures, as well as the amount of time the specific role has been serving in-person during the closure	Prioritize vaccinations for in-person school staff in areas with the highest COVID-19 positivity rates

Expanded Accomodations for Remote Work	Guarantees accommodations for all teachers and support staff who either have conditions that pose an elevated risk for COVID-19 or who are the primary caregivers for family members who have an increased risk of severe illness	Outlines a series of strategies schools can use to increase accomodation levels while meeting necessary staffing to ensure all students who return can receive a quality education in a safe environment



Category	Previous Proposal	New Proposal
Metrics to Move to Remote Instruction When Needed	Consistent criteria to determine when a classroom pod needs to be quarantined	A school will revert to online learning for 14 days if public health officials establish that transmission occurred across three separate pods and contact tracing cannot attribute it to an isolated incident. At the district level, in-person learning may be suspended if the positivity rate of district surveillance tests reaches three percent; a joint CPS/CTU safety committee will make a recommendation to the CEO and Union President to determine if all students should revert to remote learning for a period of time

Health and Safety Committee	The district and CTU were in agreement with the creation of Health and Safety committees but had not aligned on key terms of an agreement	The district and each school will begin new health and safety committees charged with ensuring safety and mitigation measures are implemented appropriately and consistently



In-Person and Virtual Attendance: Week 1


Broken out by Race






In-Person and Virtual Attendance: Week 1

Learner Model Preferences: Waves 1 & 2






Reopening Instructional Supports

 - 20+ cross-curricular teacher leaders informed the guidance and associated professional learning
 - District will capture and share teacher best practices across the district















School Readiness Metrics Publicly Available for Families at cps.edu/schoolreadiness

- To ensure CPS is prepared for the safe return of students and staff, we are collecting and sharing data on school readiness for reopening
- Data is updated on a regular basis with information about facilities, delivery of devices, HEPA air filters, face coverings, hand sanitizer, and other materials to support the health and wellness of our school community

^{*}Custodians support with limited activities at high schools such as testing, and a return to in-person learning should that decision be made. Currently, custodian staffing is prioritized for schools that are welcoming students back.



Major Investments to Improve Indoor Air Quality

- Ensured every classroom has a functional window for natural ventilation or a mechanical ventilation system to dilute air particles and move air out of the classroom
- Hired independent state-certified environmental specialists to conduct indoor air quality assessments
- Spent \$42 million for emergency supplies and supplemental HEPA air purifiers and more than \$70 million in active HVAC projects to promote proper ventilation in all schools







The District is Partnering with CDPH and OEMC to Plan for Safe, Efficient, and Equitable Vaccine Rollout

- Vaccine program is designed for staff; data do not yet exist on efficacy and safety of approved COVID-19 vaccines in youth (<16)
- Phase 1A: Vaccinate all nurses and other licensed healthcare professionals per CDPH guidelines
- Phase 1B: Vaccinate all other school-based staff using prioritization tiers





CPS Staff Who Hold Healthcare Licenses Have Been Offered Vaccinations for Phase 1A

- On January 20, we notified eligible staff of opportunities to get vaccinated at several partner providers across the city, including:
 - Innovative Express
 - Oak Street Health
 - University of Chicago
- CPS is working with CDPH and other partner providers to source opportunities and share them with employees as they are available, per our prioritization framework
- Teachers and other 1B employees are also able to contact their doctor or pharmacy for more information on vaccine availability



Next Steps for Vaccination Planning

- Set up four Vaccination Centers ("Points of Dispensing") in CPS buildings across the city to ensure prioritized and equitable access for CPS employees
- Continue to share opportunities for vaccination at partner organizations as vaccine doses become available for CPS employees

CPS' Vaccination Prioritization Strategy



Groups are prioritized for vaccinations based on the amount of time these roles have been coming to school in person and their level of exposure to other people. Staff who are 65 or older or have a high-risk medical condition as defined by the CDC will be given priority within their subgroups. ADA or caretaker accommodations will not impact placement in priority groups.

This prioritization may change based on vaccine availability and other factors.

Note: This chart does not include CPS employees who are eligible under 1a. The district recently launched partnerships to provide approximately 1,500 staff who serve in healthcare roles who are eligible under phase la to receive vaccination. Through these partnerships, there are enough vaccine doses for all eligible 1a CPS employees.

Cloth Face Coverings are One of the Most Effective Ways of Preventing the Spread of COVID-19


- Wearing a cloth face covering (CFC) can be a challenge for young children, but with support, we know they can do it.
- The strategies will support your child's understanding of the importance of wearing a CFC:
 - **Discuss**: Explain how CFCs work and why they matter. Practice what you preach. Rehearse with your child.
 - Books, Social Stories, Videos, and Online Resources:
 Use stories and online resources to engage your child in discussions around how CFCs keep us safe.





Families May Request A Cloth Face Covering Accommodation for Their Child

- Accommodation request must be based on a specific, provider-documented medical condition
- An accommodation form is available on page 10 of the Reopening Guide for Parents on cps.edu/reopening2020
- Form must be completed by a medical professional and provided to your child's principal or school nurse
- Each situation will be evaluated individually to ensure the needs of all students are met
