LSC Voting Results

Throughout the summer's LSC voting process, the district strongly encouraged robust community and student engagement. The results are as follows:

- 55 schools have opted to maintain the SRO program
- 17 schools have opted to remove the SRO program
- Schools will have updated safety plans based on their decision
- LSCs can re-visit the decision to remove SROs at any time

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Critical Improvements to the IGA

- New Eligibility and Selection Criteria
- Prohibiting use of Criminal Enterprise Information System
- Ongoing Compliance Monitoring
- Additional Critical Elements:
 - Training
 - Welcoming City Ordinances

New Eligibility and Selection Criteria

Excellent disciplinary history:

- No sustained allegations within the past five years involving excessive use of force
- No sustained Complaint Register ("CR") allegations within the past five years where the sustained finding directly relates to a verbal or physical interaction with youth
- No open CRs for which a reasonable probability exists that the officer may receive discipline for excessive force, verbal or physical interaction with youth
- Additionally, Chief of Bureau Operations (CPD) will interview all candidates, verify eligibility and provide a written attestation that all candidates have been vetted to meet the criteria
- Consistent with last year's IGA, principals will still have the opportunity to interview candidates if they wish to change their assigned SROs

Prohibiting Use of Criminal Enterprise Information System

- The proposed IGA will formally prohibit SROs from entering any information into the CPD Criminal Enterprise Information System, which will replace previous databases that were designed to store information around gang affiliation
- In addition, all CPD terminals will be removed from schools so that SROs will no longer be able to access this information

Complaint Process

- Going forward, all complaints will be directed to COPA, Civilian Office of Police Accountability
- Allows for centralized tracking to ensure swift and consistent handling of investigations
- Information will be shared during regular CPS/CPD meetings

Additional Changes

- Training
- Explicit Protection re: Immigration Concerns
- CPD will immediately notify CPS of any incidents involving an SRO's use of force in connection with his/her duties
- Budget

Ongoing Compliance Monitoring

- Meeting with CPD every two weeks
- Meeting with the Independent Monitor every month, to review key performance indicators for all parties
- Quarterly Updates to the Board of Education


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Arrest Data Overview

- It is absolutely one of our ultimate goals to eradicate the school to prison pipeline
- CPS has taken significant steps, but there is much more progress needed
- The robust engagement over SROs has only further amplified the importance of this conversation
- The deeper dive from the University of Chicago work will help us understand the root causes of what drives the pipeline and what levers can be affected to make progress towards our ultimate goal

Reduction of Arrests at CPS Schools


CPD data shows an 80% reduction in student arrests at CPS schools between SY12 and SY19



Descriptive analysis by UChicago Crime and Education Labs Data: CPD, shared by CPS


Reduction of Arrests by Race at CPS Schools

- African American: 78 percent reduction (2,433 to 526; from 1.45 per 100 students to 0.40)
- Latinx: 86 percent reduction (757 to 107; from 0.42 per 100 students to 0.06)



Racial Disparities of Arrests by Race at CPS Schools

In spite of this progress, unacceptable levels of racial disparities still exist and must be addressed. Even though the absolute levels of arrests are declining, the percentage of arrests attributed to students of color remains persistent
